



6 heavy cedar arrow shafts (for a 45-50 lb bow at least)

12 field tips (we're finding that the 160-grain ones work better)

36 5"-feather fletchings, 12 of one color, 24 of another

All of these items can be acquired from the little archery store on Storey Blvd (a few blocks east of Yellowstone)---they even sell fletchings by the dozen, instead of the 100-unit bag. Everyone's invited, even if you just want to watch everyone else do the work.

The CANDLE-MAKING class has been postponed to January, as this class will need to meet at least twice, and there isn't much free time in December (with all the holidays & feasts going on). Stay tuned for more details.

NEED HELP BUILDING A COSTUME? Maeve will help anyone---just call her and set up a time to work on it. Sharpen your needles now for some new garb by the Yuletide season!

# THE WELL-DRESSED WINTER TRAVELLER Warm garments for these Current Middle Ages

Just because you have a tunic, pants, belt, and boots, don't think you'll be covered at all outdoor events--especially not in the North, where the winter winds are bitter! When frost powders the grassy list-field, these items are handy to own (and wear!).

## Cloaks, etc.

Cloaks come in all shapes and sizes, and have varying degrees of warmth. The simplest cloaks are rectangles or circular sections of one layer of fabric. A cloak with a lining is always warmer than one without—the extra layer of air between the layers acts like insulation. Two square pieces of fabric measuring 15" x 15", sewn along two adjacent sides and attached to the neckhole of the cloak makes a hood. If you make a cloak that is fitted at the shoulders, it will hang better on its own and keep you warmer. One clasp at the neck of the cloak will keep it from falling off, but a row of sturdy buttons will keep it closed (and you warm) without tying up your hands. If you'd rather your hands were free, but don't want to freeze too much, cut slits in your cloak and border them with trim (this is period).

Capes, which are basically cloaks that are not open in the front, are also an authentic way to keep warm. The fanciest, called pelicons, were full-circle capes with a train and large, fur-lined hood. Slits for the arms were also

cut in capes.

Shawls, rectangular and triangular, were commonly used by Viking women. The warmest ones were naturally made of wool.

Caped hoods and short capes (reaching no further than the elbows) are extremely handy items because they add an extra layer of warmth around the neck and upper torso, especially when worn with a cloak. Caped hoods appear very

commonly in medieval illustrations throughout a wide time period.

The earliest form of overcoat was (what else?) a large, loose, unbelted tunic made of thick warm material which may even be lined. Often they were open up the front (fastened together by a row of buttons), and were open under the arm so that you could choose whether to slip your arms into the sleeves or not (this type of garment was known as a gardcorps). The sleeves often fell over the hands, and slits could be cut into the sleeves near the elbows as well for free hand movement.

If you have no cloak, but lots of tunics, then wear them all---layering clothes is both warm and authentic!

#### Other warm and handy items

Gloves were a very period fashion accessory, and were often highly decorated with embroidery and/or gems---get a pair of plain leather gloves and decorate them up. A cuff can be sewn on for added arm warmth.

If you don't have a hood, a hat goes a long way in keeping ears warm. Medieval illustrations show that a simple white coif covering the ears was common wear for both men and women. To make a pattern for a simple hat, measure the circumference of your head, draw a rectangle measuring half the circumference x 2" (4"-6" if you wish to turn up the brim), then extend one side up to form a point (as long as you want). This pattern is for half of the hat. If you plan to line it with fur, add a little extra to your head measurement for a comfortable fit. Believe it or not, but leawarmers (tubes of material slipped around the calf) are period (at least since Dark Ages Ireland)---binding your legs in several rabbit furs is one way to keep everything below the cloak-hem freezing. Nonetheless, a good pair of warm, hopefully waterproof boots are an indispensable item if you wish to stay comfortable while watching a tourney in a blizzard. Everything your mother told you about if the feet are warm, the body's warm, is true.

Obviously, for warm clothes, choose warm materials. Wools and wool-substitutes (Worsterlon, acrylics, wool-blends) are ideal, but can get expensive---watch for sales (I once found wool coating for 1.77 a yard-nearly 75% off the original price) and buy during the off-season. Don't use anything too stiff. Many synthetics (polyesters, etc) hold in heat; you can use that obviously-artificial-looking fabric as a lining and no one will notice its inauthentic appearance. Fake fur is really neat looking, comfortable, and warm, but rather expensive. If you choose to use fake fur, make sure you use proper colors (medieval huntsmen did not go traipsing throught the woods seeking pastel-pink bunnies for their fur).

Basically, be practical in your planning---let's say you have suitably warm boots, medium-weight pants, and a tunic that reaches mid-thigh. If you don't make your cloak at least mid-calf, your knees are going to freeze. Live in a windy clime? Make a cape or a cloak with buttons down it's entire length to keep the wind out.

Northern European climate was substantially colder and wetter than most of ours, and to them, it was part of their daily lives for part of the year. Being outdoors in a toasty warm cloak, feeling the snowflakes blowing on your face as you travel to the hall for a festive Twelfth Night feast, is all part of the Dream.

May your toes never freeze!
