

Angon: an early type of throwing spear, used by the Franks, with a barbed head and slender iron neck, the whole being about six feet long. One of its most effective methods of use was to hurtle it against an enemy and pierce his shield, dragging it down by the weight of the long shaft. The Frank could then rush in, tread on the down-slanting angon and jerk the shield from the bearer's hand, leaving him defenceless.

First detailed illustration of winemaking . The dawn of the 16th century sees the publication of many beautiful illustrations on viticulture and wine-making. Among the most detailed of these is a vintage scene from a Flemish Book of Hours of the Blessed Virgin c. 1500. In the background, grapes are being picked from vines trained up trees. There are then being carried in panniers on men's backs down to a courtyard where they are crushed in a screw press. The must is being poured carefully into wooden barrels for fermentation. Some of the new wine is then being sampled and offered by the owner to a friend or potential buyer.

Best-known wine varieties By the end of the 15th century, certain regions of Europe had become known for their production of wine from specific varieties of vine. Pinot Noir was already known as the great grape of Burgundy in the 14th century, but by around 1500 the Chenin Blanc, known locally as the Pineau de la Loire, came to be the preferred variety around Anjou; the Cabernet France, also known as the Breton, was the most popular variety from Tours and Orleans; and the Muscat began to be particularly popular in Alsace. In Italy, the 16th century saw vine growers concentrating on the grape varieties of trebbiano in Tuscany and the Marche, the vernaccia in Liguria, and the Schiava in the Po valley.

The Arts and Sciences Championship will be open to all. It will consist of three divisions and twelve categories. Division I is for items which the artisan has learned to make within the last three to five months; Division II is to demonstrate the artisan's ability to recreate a medieval item; Division III is for items which demonstrate the artisan's ability to apply medieval techniques and/or designs to an original item. In all divisions documentation is strongly recommended. The categories for the competition are: Armor; Archery Equipment; Banners and Favors; Brewing and Vinting; Calligraphy and Illumination; Costuming; Edibles, Herbs and Herbal Preparations; Fiber Arts (spinning, weaving, embroidery, cross stitch, etc.); Jewelry; Leather Goods; Performing Arts; and the ever popular Open Category.

Prizes will be awarded within each division and category. In addition there will be a Peoples Choice Award based upon the votes of those attending the event and a Champion's Choice Award chosen by our current A&S Champion, Lady Isabeau d'Andrea. Those competing for Windkeep A&S Champion must be members of the SCA and live within the Shire of Windkeep, and must enter an item in each division. The Shire of Windkeep invites all who read these letters to join them in the selection of the Heir to the Outlands Crown. The site will be the Hynds Lodge/ Camp Jack area of the Medicine Bow National Forest located 26 miles west of Cheyenne, Wy. and 26 miles east of Laramie, Wy. Site amenities include well water, pit toilets, and nature trails. All fire is to be contained. Fire extinguishers in each camp please. (no tiki torches). The Park Ranger is allowing the feast site to be discreetly wet, and the camping area VERY discreetly wet. There are also wild deer and a live stream with trout, and a beaver pond on site. All pets are to be leashed and under control at all times. Pets chasing wildlife risk being shot by Park Rangers. Site opens 12 noon on July 12 and closes at 4pm July 14.

The Saturday evening feast will be handled in a most medieval manner. One Hundred gentles will be seated in the hall and will be served first. Additional gentles will be seated on the veranda, and will receive that which is left from each course, and whatever else the cooks provide, buffet-style. Windkeep will also provide breakfast on Saturday and Sunday, for all who wish to partake. Your feast coordinators are Lady Noemi, Lady Sara, Lady Eilonwy, and Lord Bjarki.

The tentative schedule of events is as follows:

Continue 200 yards beyond the Hynds Lodge turnoff to the Camp Jack entrance. Turn right, and follow the signs to the camping area, parking area, and troll.

The indoor fighting site in case of inclement weather is the Cheyenne Equestrian Center 2098 County Road 220. Take I-25 North thru Cheyenne to exit 21. (Ridley Road) Turn west on Ridley Road (becomes Rd 220) and proceed 1.7 miles. The Equestrian Center is on the right.












MAP TO FIELD OF GOLD



This year's site offers some indoor crash space by reservation and a most spectacular setting. The site has lots of trees, water and a nice indoor feast area. Restrictions: No glass containers. All animals must be leashed at all times. If the year is dry, probably no fires will be allowed, including torches. This is a state park and all violators will be asked to leave. No one under 18 years of age will be allowed on site without a parent or legal guardian.



TECHNICALITIES OF CARVING

THE ELABORATE RITUALS OF FEASTS OF THE NOBILITY, LIKE THOSE OF HUNTING, HAD A SPECIAL LANGUAGE

Breke that dere - lesche that braune - rere that goose - lyste that swanne - sauce that capon - spoyle that hen - frusche that checkyn - unbrace that mallarde [duck] - unlace that conye [rabbit] - dismembre that heron - display that crayn disfigure that pecocke - unjoynt that bytture [bittern] - untache that curlewe - alaye that fesande [pheasant] - wynge that partyche [partridge] - wyng that quayle myne that plover - thye that pygion - border that pastry - thye that woodcock - thye all smale byrdes tymbre that fyere - tyere that egge chynne that samon - strynge that lamprye - splat that pyke - sauce that plaice - sauce that tenche splaye that breme - syde that haddok - tuske that barbell - culpon that troute - syne that cheven [chub] trassene that ele - trance that sturgion - under trance that porpose - tayme that crabbe - barbe that lopster. — MOST —— SURPRISING PIE

TO MAKE PIES THAT THE BIRDS MAY BE ALIVE IN THEM AND FLY OUT WHEN IT IS CUT UP

Make the coffin [piecrust] of a great pie or pasty. In the bottom thereof you make a hole as big as your fist, or bigger if you will. Let the sides of the coffin be somewhat higher than ordinary pies. Which done, put it full of flour and bake it, and being baked, open the hole in the bottom and take out the flour. Then, having a pie of the bigness of the hole in the bottom of the coffin aforesaid, you shall put it into the coffin [to stop up the hole], withal put into the said coffin round about the aforesaid pie as many small live birds as the empty coffin will hold, besides the [small] pie aforesaid. And this is to be done at such time as you send the pie to the table, and set before the guests: where, uncovering or cutting up the great lid of the pie, all the birds will fly out, which is to delight and pleasure show to the company. And that they be not altogether mocked, you shall cut open the small pie.

THE IMPORTANCE OF SALT

Salts, in general, not only stimulate the taste buds but are a biological necessity. Human perspiration involves loss of natural body salts, and these have to be replaced from food. Raw meat is the best provider, but a diet largely based on cooked grain and vegetables (the diet of most of humanity throughout most of history) is seriously deficient and requires supplementing with mineral salt. They became common in 1150-70 having been in use for almost 100 years.

The mail hood – coif de maille – was usually an extension of the hauberk, but could be separate. Sometimes only leather hoods were worn (see SOFT ARMOUR). When not in use the coif could be thrown back.

From 1096 padded arming caps or quilted fabric hoods were definitely worn under the coif. This was to stop the mail from tangling with the hair and chafing the skin. During the reign of William I the hair at the back of the head was trimmed and what was left was combed forward into a fringe. This hair style may have been a whim of fashion or it may actually have kept the head cool during the heat of battle, but from the end of William's reign (1087) until 1210 hair was grown to a moderate length, as were beards. Although in many contemporary illustrations up to the 13th century no garment under the mail headpiece is shown, common sense would demand that something like a padded liner be worn, just as it was under the hauberk (see SOFT ARMOUR). From 1150 it is apparent that some hauberks were worn directly over shirts, so perhaps they had soft linings of rabbit or hare fur (like the jazerant which may have been lined in this manner) as did the coifs. The coif had a flap of mail known as the ventail which covered the lower portion of the face. This hung loose at one side when not in use and it was brought across when readying for battle





and secured by a buckle or lace at the side of the face.

There will also be a mini-Field of Gold Championship Challenge for the children with boffer, bardic and archery with a junior Field of Gold Champion.



The fact that it often ends up sounding a bit like a Woody Allen movie set in rural England instead of New York doesn't hurt it, either. And so it is that this month Da'ud Bob reviews A Midwinter's Tale.


Starring an ensemble cast (in alphabetical order, just like they did on the marquee poster) Richard Briers, Hetta Chanbey, Joan Collins, Nicholas Farrell, Mark Hadfield, Gerard Horn, Celia Imrie, Michael Maloney, Julia Sawalha, and John Sessions, this is the story of one man's obsession to bring culture to the impoverished country folk by putting on a production of Shakespeare's Hamlet at Christmastime. The down side? He's got insufficient money, and besides, no good actors want to work at Christmastime. So he gathers a cast of misfits and low to no-talents about him, and they set off to "do" Hamlet.

Good points: The dialogue. Watching the auditions. Hill climbing in rollerblades. Getting a queen to play the Queen. The backstage antics of the cast. The on stage antics of the cast. The internal bickering. (Da'ud Bob has been on stage in a couple of amateur productions before [I know this comes as a great shock to many of you, but it's true!], and it's all very much "old home week" for me; extremely realistic.). The way some lines get added — and modified. ("'Tis a far, far better thing I do than I did that night with the sailor and the artichoke.") Making painted cutout figures for part of the audience so it would look like a "full house" to the actors.

Bad points: It's a movie for adults. (No, no, I don't mean that there's any sex or violence in it. But a lot of it is way over the heads of most of the kids I know. You know, an "intellectual" sort of comedy.) And the fact that it's not in wide release will make it hard to find to see it.

Zero breasts. No blood. Six dead bodies -- on the stage only. (Well, they are doing Hamlet, after all.) Nearsighted actress rolls. Personality fu. Makeup fu. Gratuitous humorous opening monologue. Academy Award nominations to all of the cast (and to scriptwriter Kenneth Branagh) for such lines as: "More Russian than fox." "Hamlet is this desk. ... Hamlet is my grandmother." "Or my middle name isn't Fabulously Talented and Modest." "I'm not just an attractive sex object, you know." "Oh, yes, you are." "Hello, kids. Stop watching Mighty Morphin Power Rangers and come see a four hundred year old play about a depressed aristocrat." A 76 on the Vomit Meter. 3½ Stars. Da'ud Bob says "The play's the thing. Check it out!"





horseback in a ball of light, the hint of wings overhead, and a single word. Well, there were othe words, too, but two which held our interest more than any of the others: "Sean Connery". I mean, there are people who would walk miles through the snow (uphill! both ways!) to hear Sean Connery read from the telephone book. But there was also that fascinating title. And so it is that this month Da'ud Bob reviews *Dragonheart*.

Starring Dennis Quaid as Bowen, David Thewlis as Einon, Dina Meyer as Kara, Julie Christie as Aislinn, and the voice of Sean Connery as Draco the dragon, this is one of those more or less classic tales of good versus evil. Bowen, a follower (though not a terribly good one that I could see) of the "old" ways, tries to teach young Prince Einon to be better than his father, who is a bit of a tyrant. Well, Einon's father gets himself killed by a bunch of peasants, and it turns out that Einon is more of a tyrant than dad ever thought of being. In the end, Bowen, a professional dragonslayer, teams up with Kara and her less than enthusiastic army of peasants and the last living dragon (all the others having been slain, several by Bowen) to overthrow Einon in the end. It's also a story about the sacrifice of self for others.


Good points: The old ruined 'Roman' castle. The traveling monk's escallop shell (a token of his been on the pilgrimage to the shrine of Saint James of Compostela). The last dragon's first faked "death" scene. The dragon's second faked "death" scene (in an entirely different, and if not for th danger, almost hilarious way). The mail worn by many of the fighting men. King Einon's mail hauberk, with the rings of two different colors making a design. The location shots. The soundtrack. The kite shields.


Not so good points: The crown. (Foremost contender for the "Ugly Hat of the Year" award.) The costumes. (Most of which were "sort of" medieval, without following the costumes of any specific time and place that I could find. And the stuff that Bowen, and the other dragonslayers, wore was pretty much fantasy. So do not, repeat, Do Not go see this movie to get costume ideas.) The "ring mail". (Latest evidence I read seem to indicate that it probably never existed in period.) Peasants in rags. (Really! Even poor people in period knew how to hem a garment, for Pete's sake. [If you'll pardon the expression!]) The animation of Draco regularly reminded me of that prime time TV comedy series which starred special effects dinosaurs: not realistic enough an occasionally "funny looking".

Zero breasts (unless you count Draco's). One gallon of blood. 42 dead bodies (not counting dragons). Sword fu. Wooden sword fu. Spear fu. Fireball fu. Tail fu. Fighters roll. Waves roll. Gratuitous special effects. (Is there anybody these days who can make a movie without either George Lucas (Industrial Light & Magic) or Jim Henson's Workshop?) Gratuitous "stick to your teeth" ribs. Academy Award nomination to Sean Connery as the voice of Draco for "Tha must have hurt" and, regarding a piece of another dragonslayer wannabe found in his teeth, "I only chewed in self-defense. But I never swallowed." Filmed in the Republic of Slovakia, a very lovely land. Wonderful final credit: "Read the Troll Book". A 65 on the Vomit Meter. Three and a half stars.
