



of the glories of the Outlands. Allez.


ATTENTION ALL ARCHERS

The following is an abriviations of a notice from Sir Jon Fitz-Rauf, keeper of the IKAC and IKCAC for the Society as a whole.

This year the Traditional Longbow division is replaced by the new Period Division. The main intent of the Period Division is to encourage the use and construction of gear with a more period appearance in SCA archery Modern style bows and arrows may still be used in the compeition. But if you use period style bows and arrows, you will get a bonus on your score. If you have made the period style equipment that you are using, you will get a larger bonus. The scoring for the Period Division of Archery will also change.

And the following changes go into effect for persons shooting crossbow. Modern style crossbows will be limited to six bolts in a speed round. Period crossbows have unlimited shots in the speed ends.


CARNIVAL

Carnival, which means "goodbye to the flesh." has been celebrated with abandon in Italy for many centuries. Carnival takes place during the 10 days prior to Ash Wednesday, the beginning of Lent, a time of prayer and self-examination when indulgences (such as meat eating and excessive revelry) must be given up.

In the Middle Ages, Carnival-goers would dress in masks, attend costume balls, drink wine and eat rich food to excess. At one time, the Carnival in Venice lasted six months! Masks would assure

anonymity for the party-goers and exempt them from any sins they might commit. Today, Carnival is still celebrated with intensity in a few Italian cities, especially Venice and Ivrea.

In Venice, the Carnival ritual was resurrected in the late 1970s. For 10 days, thousands of people gather in the most famous square in Venice—Piazza San Marco—in fair, freezing, rainy or snowy weather, to listen to music, dance wildly, and dress up in elaborate masks and fancy costumes as nuns, popes, witches, knights, soldiers. Entire families roam the streets in search of revelry. Moms, dads and babies dress up in anything from historically accurate Renaissance attire to Cinderella and Rambo costumes. Puppet shows are held, great balls hosted, operas and theater productions performed. People on the streets stage mock battles using shaving cream and anyone participating in Carnival is apt to be coated with the stuff. At the end of the festivities, a huge bonfire is started and an effigy of the King of Carnival is burned, indicating the end of the days of excess and the start of penitence and abstinence.







MAROSTICA'S LIVING CHESS GAME

A real human chess game took place in Marostica, a medieval town in the Veneto region of Italy, in 1454. Two noblemen were ordered by the town's governor to play chess to win the hand of a beautiful girl instead of fighting for her in a bloody duel.

Today, to commemorate the event, each September in even-numbered years, the town's main piazza becomes a life-sized chess board and 500 townspeople dress in rich medieval costumes to represent the pieces in a chess game. Knights wear real armor and ride real horses; castles are small buildings on wheels. Underneath the costumes are ordinary citizens of the town—shopkeepers, students, pharmacists—who practice their parts for six months prior to the performance and who have participated in the game for years, starting as a lowly pawn and moving up to an important king or queen.

The Shire of Windkeep has put in a bid to host Crown Tourney in July. Hopefully we will hear soon if we will receive this honor.



AWFULMARKS LOI - 1 APRILLUS XXV(I?)

Frederick of Hollywood (Name and Device)
Azure, in pale a unicorn's head couped to sinister and a sleeveless demi-chemise argent.

Frederick is the modern form of the OE Freodhoric, seen in the Domesday Book (Withycombe, pp. 121-2). Hollywood is a coined locative, similar to period names such as Holyoak, a residence near a "boly-oak", a tree used to mark a parish boundary (Reaney, Dictionary of British Surnames, p. 181).


Articles of clothing, such as gloves, hats, and belts, are all used as armorial charges. [Lord, I hope some folks, especially one in the West, still have a sense of humor...]



Sløgr of Baysebole - name and device

Vert, on a mascle argent four lozenges at the corners sable.


Sløgr - SPN, p. 257. Baysebole - Baythorpe is a place in Lincolnshire (Fellowes-Jensen, Scandinavian Settlement Names in Yorkshire, p. 55; SPN, p. 362, 48). From this could be devised the surname Bay. Bole is a ME word referring to a fine, compact earthy or unctuous clay (OED). CODEP has Baysdale, mayston. Bayswater (pp. 31-32).



Fess Parker (Name and Device)
Argent, a fess and in base a stag statant gules within a park sable.

Fess might be an Anglicized diminutive of the obscure Latin name Festus (Coghlan, Pocket Guide to Irish First Names, p. 32); we certainly bope that the formal Anglicized form of the name isn't Fester. Parker is found in Reancy's Origin of English Surnames, as an occupational surname, one who acts as a keeper in a (deer) park (p. 165).

This is a complete redesign of his original submission idea; he could not document a period chapeau with a bushy animal tail pendant from the back, and when we found out that the charge he called "Old Betsy" was not an elderly woman, he chose to drop it because it was out of period.



Danno of Western Seas - name and device

Argent on an open book per pale gules and azure, the letters v and 0 Or.

Danno - D. Ellis Evans, Gaulish Personal Names (GPN), p. 189-199, cites numerous examples with this as prototheme. It is a logical hypocoristic of Dannius for example. Western Seas is the SCA group located in Hawaii.



Unser Hafen Dance Collegium and Ball VI March 11, 1995

The Barony of Unser Hafen invites all to join us in the pursuit of the gentle art of dance at our Sixth Annual Dance Collegium and Ball. This year's event is to be held at the same site as last year in the McMillen Building of the Larimer County Fairgrounds in Loveland, Colorado.

The Collegium during the day will feature Western and Eastern Medieval dance forms of varying difficulty. During the Feast and Grand Ball in the evening, the dances learned during the day will be danced to live period music. In addition, there will be a grand court processional, and contests for the Most Elegant Costume, the Best Wallhanging or Banner, and the Most Romantic Favor with prizes in each category. Children's activities will also be provided.

The Hall opens at 11 A.M., dance classes begin promptly at 1 P.M., and the Hall closes at midnight. This is a dry site. Merchants are welcome. In the mid-afternoon a light lunch will be served for \$1.50 per person.

The Western dances taught by THL Catriona Sterling de Liston will be in three classes. The first class covers simpler dances including "Bransle Suite", "Earl of Salisbury Pavane", and "Upon a Summer's Day". The second class of intermediate level dances will include "Sellenger's Round", "Black Alman", and "Female Saylor". A final section of advanced dances will conclude the Western dance instruction.

The Eastern dance selection includes "An Introduction to Eastern Dance" by Lady Katerina von Lehmann followed by "Improvisational Dancing" by Mistress Rashiqah bint Azhar.

The feast by The Inn of the Mad Woman will begin with a setup of breads, cheeses, and fresh vegetables. A main course will follow of Lemon Chicken and Fruit Pilaf, Dilled Salmon in Aspic, Beef Burgundy and Noodles, and Vegetables with Vinegarette. Enough to satisfy anyone's taste! The feast will be capped with a dessert of White Grape Lemon Curd with a sublety cake. Side boarding space will be available.

All musicians are welcome! Music is available by mail from the Autocrats in advance, or at the site during the event. Some crash space is available with advance notice. Arrange this with the Autocrats.

The site fee is \$4.00 for SCA members; nonmembers will be charged the additional \$3.00 site surcharge. The feast fee is \$7.00 if reservation is received prior to the event, \$9.00 at the door. Book Review

This is a brief review of three heraidry books found at the Laramie County Library in Cheyenne, Wyoming.


"Heralds and History" by Roger Milton, is written in easy, basic language. There are good drawing examples of differing, and rules of blazon. The book is divided into several chapters on subjects such as tinctures; partitions; ordinaries; common charges; rules of blazon; differencing and marshalling of arms; crests, crowns and coronets. It also shows some of the more well-known arms of British people.

"The Romance of Heraldry" by C. Wilfrid
Scott-Giles Bluemantle Pursuivant of Arms. There are
261 illustrations in the 234 pages of this book. The
author has selected coats of arms, badges, and other
emblems with a stress on British history. Some of the
people mentioned and famous moments are Robert the
Bruce, several Edwards, Bannockburn, Agincourt, Joan
of Arc, Richard II, Mary Queen of Scots, and the War
of the Roses. This book is different from most
heraldry books in that this one has brief quotes from
Shakespeare's works, the Anglo-Saxon Chronicles, Norse
Sagas, the poet Lydgate, and the ballad of Otterburn,
to name a few. The quotes do relate to the person or
subject discussed, which makes interesting reading.

"Boutell's Manual of Heraldry" 1978 Revised by J.P. Brooke-Little Richmond Herald of Arms. Like the other two heraldry books this is divided into several chapters which are short and to the point making it easy to understand. One of the chapters I found most helpful is "Heraldic Charges; explains and shows examples of the lion; deer; fish; reptitles; insects; monsters; trees and plants; and flowers. With more than 50 pages given to the glossary and the index it seems to be the best of the three books reviewed to find a definition or check information on a particular subject.
