MINUTE REPORT

9 - 10 August, A.S. XXI/1986
Andrew's Report

There were 46 people in attendance at this year's Invitational. This included 10 from their Halls, 4 from Caver's, 5 from Coe's, and 3 guests. The remaining 24 were locals, some of whom we hadn't seen in many months. (See attached list.)

On Saturday, after nearly everyone had arrived and set up, lunch was served. Following lunch, Lt. Tod Coffey, assisted by Tutor the Seeker held the two rounds of the Knife and Star throwing competition. (See attached list for winners).

Lt. Elaine and I held the Children's quiz for coloured plastic eggs. All children who participated were "co-winners".

Following these events, Lt. Thomas the Hute put on a rapier demo and school for all interested parties.

At the conclusion of this demonstration, the Day Quest was held. There was some joking talk about lynching the instructor for thinking up such terrible puns. (See attached list for winners.)

The Arts & Sciences Competition was held during the entire day, and was most kindly judged by Lt. Elizabeth Macmountain, Kinptom Arts & Sciences Officer. (See attached list of winners.)

In the late afternoon, there was challenge fighting before all sat to the feasting.

The feast exceeded even my most optimistic hopes. There was more than enough food for the 39 feasters. Mr. Kelly Ronette had the courses well-prepared and perfectly prepared. Her preparatory and servers did an outstanding job of seeing that all were kept supplied with food without being overwhelmed with too much at any one time. I received many compliments on this feast. (See attached list of winners.)

In the evening, there was a scampager hunt scheduled that had to be cancelled due to rain. However, the bardic circle gathered under cover, contained into the late evening and was enjoyed by all.

Saturday morning after breakfast, the first raising auction was held and conducted by Andrew Mackay, who did his usual excellent job.

Following this, the Prize/Defender tourney was held with 6 fighters. Lt. Arshak the Golden Wolf was the winner, followed in second place by Tutor Cooney and Lt. Gaten of Biltshire. (See attached list of participating fighters.)

The awarding of prizes was done by the intendant, after allowing the fighters a short time to rest and change. (See attached list of prizes.)

Following the awarding of prizes, the site was cleaned and all returned to their homes.

I was more than grateful that Aloba allowed the Shrine the use of her G.P. Median tent, as the tent would have been raised out had it not been under cover. This tent also served as a gathering point throughout the weekend and provided shelter for the bards on Saturday evening and the merchants on Sunday.

Ronette planned the feast so well that there was a bare minimum of food to bring back, yet everyone had their fill at our four different meals during the weekend. She is to be most highly commended for this feat. She has advised that our Shrine reputation for seeing that no one went hungry remains intact.

Due to the length (almost 2 1/2 hours) of the auction, the Children's Raising competition, scheduled for Sunday, also had to be cancelled.

The only other event that didn't go off as planned was the Faira's sit-down resection breakfast. I was not informed why this wasn't done. However, everyone did get fed, anyway.

Our poor healer was nearly run off her feet during this event. For some reason, there were far too many assorted injuries. "Fortunately" only two of them potentially serious. We had to take two people into the hospital. One of them later returned to the event, the other went home. She also treated 10(1) others for minor injuries. I was upset at the number of people being hurt and felt quite badly about it all. Lt. Elaine reports to me that the biggest thing that upset her was the 6 trained members of the Healer's Guild in our Shrine that did nothing to help her, expecting her to handle everything alone. I was unaware of this until she talked to me after the event.

There are a few things I would change, in looking back at this event. First, I feel I made the quest too difficult, and should have had more clues for the questers. I had not done a Run Quest before, and was uncertain how much in the way of clues were necessary. Secondly, even though we had no royally present, I would have preferred a head table of sorts, as the seating arrangement was a bit awkward for serving, bardic entertainment, etc. I would also shorten the first raising auction as it was way too long. Lastly, I would have had some of the events, such as the rapier demo and the poplitea knife and star throwing last a bit longer, so that things would have run more smoothly.

We were fortunate that there were only a few people present who have not yet started courteous behaviour to others. As these are mostly within our own group, this is an area we, as a Shrine, are going to have to stress harder. Everyone else exemplified civility and courtesy the entire weekend.

I would like to especially thank the following people, without whom I could not have had this event go so smoothly as it did.

Lt. Tod Coffey. My right hand, always there. My alter ego. Every-thing I needed to be in two places at once for, he was in the second place for me. Totally indispensable.

Aloba Zupun. He brought his van and a large trailer with all the materials for setting up the feast, the tables, and kitchen, the lists and extra tents for those wishing to camp but who had no tents of their own. He literally gave the success of the event to his remembering all the material things that were needed for use at the event. He also, after spending hours setting up, ran his legs off helping everyone, especially the feasting and the Arts & Sciences.

Ronette Ronen. As mentioned above, did the most outstanding job on this feast, as well as Saturday's and Sunday's lunches and Sunday Breakfast. She also was my emotional prop whenever I felt things were starting to come unglued.

Lt. Elizabeth Macmountain for most kindly coming up and judging the Arts and Sciences competition, and filling in as Prof when ours came down ill. This lady was most generous with her time and knowledge. She has my sincere thanks, as well as the sincere thanks of the Shrine.

Lt. Thomas the Hute. This gentleman, after coming up the 'play', was everywhere. He was marshalled for the Prize List. He was part-time healer. He put on the rapier demo and school. He was assistant to the healer and took over for her when she had to assist in taking one of our two serious injuries into the hospital. He also entertained at the feast Saturday evening, whereas he was able to be of assistance, he was always right there. My deepest thanks to him.

TREASURER'S REPORT

The Windkeep Invitational was held August 9th and 10th. This is an expense account of what we spent and made those two days. We had 26 feast fees at \$6 each; the total is \$156.00; 3 children at \$4 so that total was \$12.00; and 5 late feast fees at \$8 bringing in \$40.00, so the entire total was \$208.00.

We had 33 people pay a site fee of \$2.00 bringing in \$66.00.

Arts and Science entries were 25¢ with 21 people paying, thus bringing in \$5.25. I collected \$8.00 for the brunch Sunday. The total income collected was \$287.25. The auction brought in \$288.70 total (\$40 of this is to be added to the treasury within the next 3 months). The total income with the auction came to \$575.95.

The following expenses were paid out: Food, \$119.88; potty, \$126.00; prizes, \$58.00; refund on gas to the hospital for an injury, and feast refunds thus an expense of -\$24.88.

The following expenses were donated: Copies from Kinko's, \$7.38; feast refunds \$15.00; and the expense of \$28.35 for the ceramic drinking vessel used for prizes from Mlodn. (The finished wholesale price would be \$68.00 in expenses for the making of 16 drinking vessels). Other expenses not put in and donated was very close to \$100.00 from Lord Tod and Lady Ceallach.

For the next invitational I will not offer refunds for feast competition entries to keep the expense down. I may even charge an entry fee.

I liked the menu we planned; the rolls worked out better than bread; the soup expense was low due to using the turkey broth, and we again cut expenses by omitting cheese which no one seemed to miss. I did a very good job of buying the food. We had very few left-overs.

The following people were especially kind in helping out before the actual day itself: Mlodn, Lady Ceallach, Lord Tod, Laural and her mother.

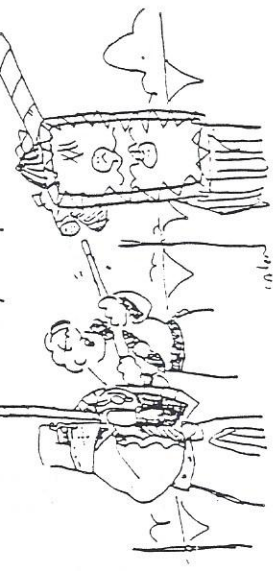

So why not start looking to the past for a lot of answers to the years of questions?

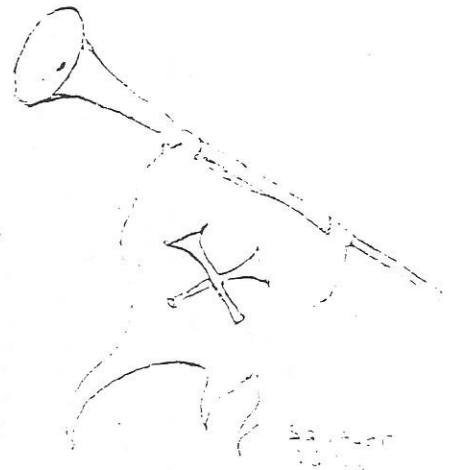

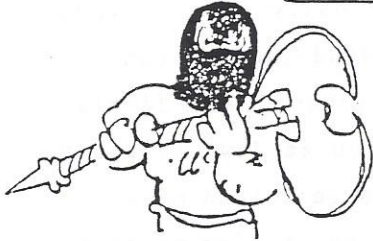
THE LIFE AND TIMES OF I.C. MOOR

I quickly learned that being a squire was not what I was destined for in life. I found my interests leaned toward spending time in fathers wine cellar and being in the company of my "sisters". I also had the desire to travel out of the local area to lands far away. But until my opportunity came I was stuck with the same old daily routine. Up at dawn, slave the day away learning to be a good little fighter, studying tactics and military maneuvers then running hither and yon doing this chore and that. Finally after a long evening meal (depending on the stores level) it was more studying til sunset. After sunset I was frequently visited by one or more "sisters" and finally managed to get to sleep well into the night. Then it was up at dawn to start all over again. This lasted until I was twelve. Then I was sent into military service. I was posted to a little out of the way garrison on the far northern border. Located high on a moor overlooking a river I spent the next three years getting some field experience and learning how to survive. There were infrequent attacks that took the lives of the unwary. Garrison duty was really boring (no females) and I quickly learned to volunteer for patrol duty. This got me away from the garrison for a week at a time. It gave me an opportunity to get to know the local area and people. In a year I was promoted to man-at-arms from slaughter fodder. Six months later I became patrol leader and spent most of my time away from the garrison. I especially enjoyed the patrols to York Towne to escort supply caravans back to the garrison as it was a chance to have some ale and the companionship of a "wench" for the night before returning to the garrison. After three years in the field I was posted to Colchester. I spent the next year moving about every four months to another posting. I gained valuable knowledge and experience with each move. Finally at seventeen I received a commission to company commander and was given a mixed company of mounted men-at-arms and archers. We spent about six months training before being sent north. I still had no use for garrison duty so I put my second in command in charge of the garrison and began constant area patrols to get to know the area and local wenches. After about eleven months I received another posting. My second in command remained behind to command the garrison. I took about one third of the command with me. Upon arrival at Colchester we formed a larger company of mounted troops. We then divided into three companies and spent the next two years travelling about the country quelling riots and terminating troublemakers wherever required. Thus ends another chapter in my story.

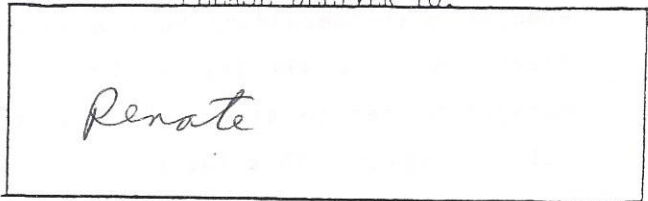
